He knows we need divine help, so he advises further, "by prayer and petition... make your requests known to God." We generally feel comfortable doing that, but Paul additionally says to do it "with thanksgiving." We are to be grateful for what we have when we ask God for something more. This will lead to inner peace.

At times we let our minds wander to places of despair and dwell there longer than necessary. Paul gives different advice about where to park our brains: "whatever is true, whatever is honorable, whatever is just, whatever is pure, whatever is lovely, whatever is gracious, if there is any excellence and if there is anything worthy of praise, think about these things."

Matthew and Shannon, you have shown us the way. You have thought about the excellence in the world, the realm of possibility, and the results that come from a clear-eyed vision of the future even when others may have thought their own happiness seemed impossible. That vision will help you throughout your married life.

Christ joins you in this celebration today, and he will accompany you every day. With trust in him, love for each other, and love for other people, you will find peace amid chaos. Beginning with your own family, and giving thanks to God, you will help him bring peace to the world.
